He has shown you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God?

God told us such a very long time ago what is required; not to be members of a particular Church or Political party, but to be a people who do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with our God.

Do is such an active word isn't it, it demands more from us always, and so it is with our commitment to justice. God demands that as followers / disciples of Jesus we are people who do and do and keep on doing justice.

God demands that we be a people who love mercy that we act as if mercy and the grace of God are the driving forces for all we do in our private and public lives.

And of course that we walk humbly with God. No place for strutting and pride and feeling like we are the chosen few. No titles or honoured seats here in Jesus Kingdom. No we walk humbly with God.

Justice, mercy and walking humbly with God are so evident in the Lent journey of Jesus. He followed paths of justice and mercy even when it meant standing up to ineffectual or crooked and dishonest leaders. For Jesus the commitment to justice mercy and humility led him to eat and talk with people the religious rulers said were unworthy, unclean or lost. Jesus commitment to justice and mercy led him to turn over some tables, and to refuse to sit at others; it led him to be such an offensive annoying person that most of the crowd and some of his friends had deserted him before eventually it led the political leaders of his day execute him.

I wonder if we are on the same track as Jesus, pursing justice mercy and humility?

I wonder what tables might we have to turn over if we are to be faithful to the Jesus we

proclaim in our Lenten faith?

I wonder what people we would have to share fellowship outside of our comfort zones? I wonder who we wouldn't be able to share fellowship with unless we are prepared first stand up for justice and mercy and challenge the policies of our day as Jesus did in his?

I pray that you and I would be challenged again this Lent as we reflect on Jesus and his journey from security and adulation to accusation lies and solitude, to the terrors of the Garden of Gethsemane, and the horror of being executed by a rotten Government who cared only for the powerful and wealthy.

I pray we like our Lord would have the passion of God in our minds and hearts; that we would pursue justice and mercy for all and especially for those whose voices are not heard in the corridors of power; and that the blessing God would be ours as we humbly walk with our God.

REVELATIONS AND BEYOND by Joan Gomer

On Thursday evenings we have been studying the Book of Revelation – not an easy subject!

In preparation we were asked to find out how the book and its imagery have been portrayed outside of the Bible. I astounded the members with this piece of trivia!

Revelation Ch. $3 \vee 20 - Behold I$ stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with him and he with me.'

This verse inspired Holman Hunt's painting 'The Light of the World'.

Hunt was one of the Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood of artists. Another was Dante Gabriel Rossetti, whose sister, Christina, wrote many poems including 'In the Bleak Midwinter' and 'Love Came Down at Christmas'.

Christina would act as a model for the artists, provided she approved of the subject matter and Holman Hunt used her for Christ in 'The Light of the World'. So when you look at that picture of Christ, you are actually seeing Christina Rossetti!

Debbie, who admires the Pre-Raphaelites was inspired to do further research and tells me that whilst Christ's face is Christina's, the hair is not. Hunt has used the hair of yet another of his models.

CONSIDER THE LILIES OF THE FIELD by Christina Rossetti (1830-1894)

FLOWERS preach to us if we will hear:-The rose saith in the dewy morn: I am most fair; Yet all my loveliness is born Upon a thorn. The poppy saith amid the corn: Let but my scarlet head appear And I am held in scorn: Yet juice of subtle virtue lies Within my cup of curious dyes. The lilies say: Behold how we Preach without words of purity. The violets whisper from the shade Which their own leaves have made: Men scent our fragrance on the air, Yet take no heed Of humble lessons we would read. But not alone the fairest flowers: The merest grass Along the roadside where we pass, Lichen and moss and sturdy weed, Tell of His love who sends the dew, The rain and sunshine too, To nourish one small seed.

And run the course of day Till evening comes in crimson rays His fingertips in flakes of snow His breath upon this spinning globe He charts the eagle's flight Commands the new born baby's cry Hall-el-ujah Let all creation stand and sing, Hall-el-ujah Fill the earth with songs of worship Tell the wonders of creations king.
