Dear Heavenly Father


We pray for all who proclaim the Good News of Jesus in our town of Colchester, and we think of the agencies who work to help the troubled and the needy here in the town.

As we muse on this question, focus on the Methodist Orb.

Notice the empty cross.

Reminding us that Jesus lives

Jesus is everywhere in the world... in the universe and beyond.

So where can we have encountered God?

Look at the red background.

Why the colour red?

Red for Jesus' blood shed for us, our salvation.

Red is the liturgical colour of the Holy Spirit.

Try recalling that the Wesley brother's hearts were 'strangely warmed' by both

That may explains to us why red is important for Methodism

Do we feel confident of our faith and our domination and feel ready for a divine encounter?

Can we predict when and where this will occur?

Can we dare to constrain the power of the Almighty? And expect it to happen at an allotted time and space? Will it be when we attend church; surely this is a safe environment to come into the Awesome one's presence. Think deeper what is the Methodist way of life calling us to do? Is it calling us to trust in our relationship with Jesus?

Jesus encounters were inclusive

To act like Jesus?

from different races, creed, colour, rich and poor, outcasts Jesus did not discriminate, and God has not got favourites

Have we learnt not be judgemental or discriminate on someone's outward appearance

Jesus could be a vagrant in disguise, a bisexual person, a woman, a child We need to be open to encounter with him through our relationships with others

Those in our worshipping community and beyond To do this we must be inclusive of all traits be them, race, age, sexual orientation We should be ready to walk in someone else's shoes To challenge injustices and be an activist.

The black circumference line all around the orb shape reminds us of connections.

The connexional structure of The Methodist Church in Britain which embraces diversity

We are connected to the World Methodist Council,

Collectively we are all called to encourage more people to hear of and become followers of Jesus Christ

Where and when have we encountered God?

Listening to other Christian traditions and to people with other faiths or no faith helps.

We are aware that the Holy Spirit can fill any nook or cranny in the entire world

It is possible to see the work of the Holy Spirit in any situation thus making encounters with God universally available to all.

Take a moment and look at the whole Methodist Orb and cross, not just it is components.

The emblem of the Methodist Organization is like the Trinity, no one part can function on its own

A moment silence	•
Realise something else.	

Where have we encountered God was it today, tomorrow, did it happen yesterday?

Encounters with God can occur at any time, any place, and through anybody (even us!).

Was it in the ordinary or extraordinary?

Can we think of an extraordinary encounter, one of my own was through the words of a young child, sitting as a passenger in the back of the car, simply he said "be kind", and he could have been Jesus speaking.

Maybe the best encounter we can have with God is through Jesus when we ask him to forgive our sins and followed him This reconciled us with God

What an extraordinary encounter to have. Amen

50 YEARS OF BEING A VOLUNTEER ADVISER FOR THE COLCHESTER CITIZENS ADVICE

I received a phone call about one month ago, expressing disappointment that the Colchester Citizens Advice were not able to give me the big celebration that they had hoped, on the occasion of a forthcoming celebration to celebrate my 50 years as a volunteer, due to the COVID situation.

I stressed that I would not have wanted that anyway, and I would have turned it down, and agreed that if they wanted to do anything I would be more than happy with a small celebration. So it was just me and our two daughters that went along to the office on 28 January. It was held in our new office which is now at the bottom of North Hill, in Middleborough, in the LEPRA building.

Our new CEO was there, and selected members of staff, advisers, VIP's and Trustee members. We were made so very welcome, and the atmosphere was amazing. By the time the day came, I really didn't want to go, I really didn't know what to expect, who I was going to see, and I had so many qualms!

After the initial supply of some refreshment, the Chairman of the Trustee Board began the proceedings, and this is what was said:-

"We are here today to mark and celebrate an awesome milestone achieved by an amazing person. Margaret, you have devoted 50 years to Citizens Advice.

You started your journey with CAB in January 1972, and since then you have been a stalwart member, as both a volunteer and as a member of staff.

Along the way you have been presented with a Colchester Community Award, and over 20 years ago you received the first ever Citizens Advice Lifetime Achievement award, which was presented to you by HRH Princess Anne, in recognition, - of way back then, being the longest serving CAB volunteer in the country of the entire UK. Then in the year 2000, you topped all that with a presentation from HM Queen Elizabeth 2nd. Amazing!

You have been a manager, and a deputy manager here in Colchester; you were a supervisor at Tendring /Clacton for 14 years; a manager at Harwich; you did work for the National Association of Citizens Advice, and still managed to be an adviser here at Colchester. You then took on the post as a trainer for all newcomers, and you did this for 9 years.

Throughout the whole time, you always did a few hours on one day each week as a volunteer worker (unpaid)

It has been calculated that you personally have helped/advised many, many thousands of clients in the last 50 years.

I think I can say without fear of contradiction that you are the longest serving member/volunteer in the world. And from the bottom of our hearts, we thank you for all you have contributed."

What a memorable couple of hours!

I was then presented with some lovely gifts, and short speeches were made, and I was quite overwhelmed with the kind remarks that were said. Our current CEO, BEV, whom I had only met once said a few words, as did four of the others.

I was given a lovely cake, flowers, and photos were all around of myself with HM Queen Elizabeth and also when I was with HRH Princess Anne.

I was thrilled, delighted and overwhelmed with everything, this was all so unexpected, and such a wonderful surprise, but the final item I was given was incredible! It was a 'This is Your Life - 50 years at Citizens Advice' this was just amazing! Our very hard working PA in the office, had created this, and there were 49 different people who had written personal messages to me, and recalling our time together. Some of these were people I had worked with in the past, trainees I had trained, managers I had worked with, VIP's, top people from Citizens Advice. I will treasure this forever, and thank very sincerely anyone who had contributed in any way.

I have to admit, that afternoon, at home, I was alone, and I read every one of them, and I had a few tears!

I am so very fortunate to work for a charity, which is an organisation that is so caring, which has a first class information system, triggers fantastic resources, accurate information for their staff and advisers, - and to be part of a wonderful team of people who really care!
