Dear Friends,

Remembering is a word that sums up the month of November.

All Saints Day is celebrated at the start of November in the Roman Catholic and Anglican Churches and I wish it was as important for us Non Conformists too. It certainly was for John Wesley. It is always good and important to pause in the midst of our lives to remember those who have gone before us, special people who we have loved and see no more.

For those of us who have lost grandparents and parents, perhaps in an even more powerful way those of us who have lost partners or children there is a real sense in which we constantly live with the pain of loss and grief. Yet there is something quite powerful about stopping and doing nothing but remembering and giving thanks at All Saints Day.

We have many dozens of candles in our home, and this year as in years before I will light a few candles and dig out some photographs to remember those friends and family who have gone but are certainly not forgotten. We will do this at Church too at the very end of October, making some time to pray for strength and give thanks of course, but mostly to just be still, to remember and celebrate.

For me that remembering makes November a sad and yet warm time. As always I will remember my friend Paul who I trained for the Methodist Ministry with and who died so young 10 years ago. I will remember so many people I have ministered to. I

will think back on the funerals I did for my Dad and Mom, my Aunt and Uncle, all of whom I loved so much.

Remembering is so important. We must never forget those who have gone before us and have to keep talking about them.

I would encourage you to do this too, if you read this after All Saints Day and didn't do, make some time to do it another day.

Just a few days later we will of course pause again to remember those who laid down their lives defending our way of life. **Remembrance Sunday** has been part of life since I was 5 or 6 marching with the BB and sitting in a cold, cold church. Back then I had no idea what I was really doing I guess but it's become such an important time. It's always been a huge part of our lives hasn't it, pausing wherever we are on the 11th at 11.00 a.m. and being part of the many community services at Cenotaphs up and down our land.

As Christians it is important that we are part of this corporate remembrance but it is important too that we do not lose sight of the gospel imperative to seek justice, peace and hope at all times, to offer a counter cultural message of love for all, even our enemies. As Christians that is non-negotiable.

So this month remember and of course shed a tear or two, remember and thank God for all that He has given us in the past. Pray and be still remembering not just those who have gone before us, but those who laid down their lives that we might be free. And in all of it never lose sight of the hope that holds us fast, that nothing can ever separate us from God.

NOTES FROM THE VESTRY

Like Joe - I too think that the Harvest Festival service is one of my favourite dates in our church calendar. This year was no exception. As always the flowers looked absolutely beautiful, and the ladies that spent so much time on putting these together, and decorating our church, must take the credit for the final result, that contributed to how really lovely the church looked. In the week coming up to that Sunday, I was talking to a friend, who worships at another church, and she was very upset and disappointed because in her view there were no harvest hymns that she knew - the hymns were all very dull, and certainly nothing that reflected the joy and pleasure of harvest festivals. Well certainly Wimpole Road came up trumps as usual! We sang all our favourite hymns with absolute gusto, and Peter clapped louder than ever, after the choir had sung the introit. Any cash collections that day were donated to our Make Lunch project, which is so well used, and also to the Community Pantry, which again is within our church, and seeks to provide items for people in need within New Town.

I was very interested to know that Joe, Andrew and Christine, went into St. George's School on 17th October Monday morning, to take the harvest assemblies. They took 3 in all, 1 at the infants and 2 at the juniors. I am told that all went really well and the 600 children in total were well behaved and attentive, lots of hands up to answer the questions and give their ideas of who or what we should be thankful for. Food and mums seemed to be the 2 most popular answers! I am told that Andrew and Chris played the parts of the 'glamorous assistants' and Joe did all the hard work, (but I am sure Joe would be the first to say how blessed he felt to have their presence there to assist.) The theme was The Harvest of Love, and it was explored that, if you are kind to others, even those you don't know well or like very much, how much more love and kindness we actually end up with ourselves. That's what God made us for and there is more than enough of his love to go round for everyone.

The next venture is the 5th December when the children will come to Wimpole Road for an Advent assembly - I am sure we will be looking forward to it.

Since a recent talk, I have been asking myself, what do I do, or what have any of us done about Climate Change, which is happening as we speak, and having very serious impact and devastation upon our world? (Having spoken to some in our area, I know that there are many people out there who **are** making a pledge to change their current lifestyle to a simpler one). Sally Crafer - one of our newly appointed local preachers was the leader at our service recently, and she delivered thought provoking, informative short talks on Climate Change, which certainly made me, sit up and think 'Are you doing anything about Climate Change and the prevention of?' I have, since that days service thought much about what was said, and I certainly admit I am guilty of not doing my bit as much as I can, and as often as I can. She certainly gave us food for thought. Two of the hymns chosen on that day were 727 and 729, and I would commend you to look at the sentiments within those hymns.

Below, are some of the suggestions how we can do our bit and perhaps be prepared to commit to add our efforts to try and halt the current damage that's being done to Gods creation.

I refer to the words of William Wilberforce, who wrote about the wonderful creation that was made for us by God.

"In the beginning there was nothing, and out of nothing you fashioned a universe, so vast, so unimaginable that we can only sigh with amazement and wonder, when we stare upwards on a starlit night. And within this place of beauty that you created, you positioned the earth, you populated it, provided for it, and designed for it to be a place of beauty. Creator God, we thank you."

We know that we have badly damaged this creation that was created by the Lord. We are very aware that we are now running out of time. Let us in our prayers ask for help and guidance in doing all we can to make our church at Wimpole Road, a beacon of hope, to change our life style, and encourage others to do the same. Let us make this a safe place to live, for those who are climate refugees, for those in extreme poverty,

we know that very often these unhappy and dire circumstances can be caused by climate change, in different parts of the world in which we live.

Let us:

- Respect and protect green spaces
- Encourage the use of alternatives to plastic
- Cut consumption of waste
- Plant something
- Reduce energy use and bills
- Turn off some lights
- Turn off some taps
- Make our voice heard by the people who have the power to make public the terrible devastation and the damaging results of climate change to the masses.

There are many, many more ways of course that we are able to do; these things are in the power of most of us. Let us not forget:

The earth is the Lord's, and it is ours to enjoy.

Then our children, grandchildren, great grandchildren and our future generations yet to come will be able to inherit the beautiful creation that started it all off.

The Stewards are now beginning to make preparation for the Christmas period in our church, when we remember and celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. As always it has been a busy time in our church year, with many events and occasions that we remember with joy, and some with sadness.

It has been a delight to see how 'networking' has flourished in our church at Wimpole Road; the Make Lunch Club, the Coffee Morning, the Uniform Exchange and other ventures. We give huge thanks to the group of church members and others who are, or have been part of this, and all others who have contributed in any way. We couldn't do this without you. We rejoice that our congregation continues to increase, and that we have welcomed friends who have recently come to join us for worship.

As always we remember people who are on our prayer list, or ones we know who are in need of prayers at this time; those who no longer are able to come to our church services, because of health or other reasons; for those who have been bereaved, and are still coping with the loss of a loved one.
