It was the 24th anniversary of my ordination last Wednesday 28th June 2023. Together with my year of students, from Queens College in Birmingham, we were received into Full Connexion at Southport Conference - when Ministers, both Deacons and Presbyters (Ministers of word and sacrament) enter ceremonially into covenant relationship with the Methodist Conference. At the heart of this mutual relationship, made possible through God's grace, both the Ministers and the Conference have privileges and responsibilities.

Later that day I was ordained at Birkenhead Methodist Church - for me the most special part of the day. During that service the congregation say on behalf of the whole Church as loudly as possible '*They are worthy*' and it meant so much.

Including my probation years, that means I have been honoured and blessed beyond my wildest dreams to serve as one of Mr Wesley's Preachers and Ministers for 26 years.

Those years training. and even more in these long years of serving the church. I have found that mission and church is really not that complicated as long as you work locally, listen and share hospitality with your community. Whenever Churches have embraced that ethos during my Ministry they have grown, but sadly in every area there have been some Churches and people who refused to embrace hospitality and all inclusive radical love, and they have dwindled and in quite a few cases closed. It has been a joy to watch Wimpole Road prosper; God has been good to us.

We can have our grand schemes and over arching big visions from Connexion, District or Circuit, but none of it is worth a 'hill of beans' if we don't do the basics right locally.

In Methodism the local Church Council is the primary director of mission and worship and we should never forget that, because the kingdom comes and the church does its loving missional job if we get the basics of welcome and love right locally.

On my recent retreat with the Northumbria Community back in May I met Isaac (not his real name) who is an Archdeacon in the Anglican Church and works ecumenically with the Methodist Church. He summed up powerfully in his context and for us too the church's problem with mission and ministry.

We stood on a Northumbrian beach looking around us and noticing where God had led us and where he was leading us, and noticing the things that anchored us and fed us, the things that drain and limit us. It was a wonderful morning.

We all could see in the distance the ruin of a large Anglican Church, but Isaac became fixed on it. He felt God speak into his situation and the plight of the wider Church.

He told us that too often we think the big Connexion, Synod, Diocesan, District and Circuit mission schemes are our priority, when all that really matters and can work is the life worship and mission of the local parish and Church.

He said, from even more experience of missional work than me, that when we take our eye off hospitality and local graceful loving kind welcome we lose and die.

He saw, and I see, in the relics of dead places Churches that stopped reaching out and just focused instead only on themselves, and inevitably their small rut became a grave. God carried on moving gracefully but not through them anymore.

If we want this local place to end up as a relic, a ruin of faith that points to a lost mission we will ignore the two Godly principles of hospitality and love.

Serving as your Minister these last four years has been a huge highlight of my life. It's been a joy to listen and learn from you, and join in the work God was already doing here. As we have concentrated on hospitality and all embracing inclusive radical love, we have deepened our discipleship and grown as a Church. I pray that growth continues.

We will watch from Stoke on Trent and pray for you and this wonderful Church. Keep on seeking the local and the demonstrating to New Town just how kind, friendly and loving God's people are.

May the road rise up to meet you.

May the wind be always at your back.

May the sun shine warm upon your faces;

the rains fall soft upon your fields

and until we meet again,

may God hold you in the palm of His hand

As we prepare to say au revoir to our now dear friends Joe and Dave, I'd like to say a huge thank you to them for all that has been accomplished since their arrival in September 2019. Joe for his enthusiastic and creative approach to ministry and Dave for supporting him throughout. There is much to remember and celebrate.

When some of us first met our prospective new minister we were introduced to the Rev. J. Neil Adams. During an informal chat he was asked what the 'J' stood for. "Joseph" came the reply. "I've wanted to be called by my first name for a long time, but it's difficult to know when to change when everyone knows you as Neil". "Well, it's a good time now as no one here knows you at all" - one cheekily responded and the rest as it's said... I'm guessing it took Dave a while to get used to it!

A promising start to ministry with inspirational preaching, leading our Bible fellowship meeting, a school assembly and Christmas, then six months in, lockdown!

However, we were supported and encouraged to start the FaceTime Sunday worship with regular preaching from Joe and our local preachers, which continued all through those most difficult of times. 'Three in One' followed with a weekly prayer meeting and an evening Bible study, still ongoing with the Bible study moving to a monthly house meeting; Joe still conducts some of the 6.30 p.m. Sunday facetime worship sessions.

Before all Covid restrictions were over, Joe became sick and reluctantly took time away from ministry to repair and recover. Following that was his much needed sabbatical (postponed at least twice) before he was able to return to us. What a joy to have him back at the helm.

His Sunday preaching still inspires us, 'Dreaming of the Future' meetings give us a vision of how we can continue to bring Christ's abundant love into our community. Joe and Dave are regular attendees at the Coffee Mornings, sharing the joy of the Gospel with all who are there.

As a result of 'Dreaming' we have a same sex marriage license, invited our neighbours to take a friend to coffee at the GO4 cafe and continued to work ecumenically with our friends from St. Stephen's and St. Margaret's. We've visited St. George's School, hosted their pupils in the Church, received an eco friendly award and are about to set up a Community Prayer Box outside our Church. Home communions have been shared, pastoral visits made, celebrations of baptisms (infant and adult) and confirmations enjoyed and we have been sensitively supported in saying goodbye to some of our nearest and dearest.

So thank you, we hope your time with us has been a blessing to you both too. We will be sad to say farewell but are eager to carry on with God's work prayerfully and enthusiastically with our new Minister Rev. Hannah Chun.
