Dear Friends,

I have been thinking a lot about what it means to 'let go' lately. Twenty days into my first ministry appointment I tested positive for Covid. A very 'positive' start shall we say (please excuse the pun)! It caught me off-guard and I don't think I was prepared for the emotional roller coaster that ensued. I thought I was doing quite well with things lined up in my diary, with all my ducks in a row (to a certain degree) with places to go, people to visit and meetings to attend. Then all of a sudden when I could no longer meet with people and it was sensible not to, I felt I had lost control and I was back to square one.

As people, we like to have a sense of control. We want to know what is around the corner. We want to be prepared so we know how to react in the moment. Some or most of us like to have our lives planned out and hope they stay that way. Many of us may not handle surprises very well. There may be a sense of loss mixed in with the emotions of guilt when we can't do the things we had planned or be the person we had hoped to be for others.

Jesus seems to give us a lesson in letting go in one of his obscure statements: '*Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven*' (Matthew 18:18). I feel Jesus is telling us to think about what we choose to bind or loose and what we hold onto tightly or let go, and why. Whatever we choose to hold onto or let go will echo and resonate deeply in God's heart also, because God cares for our wellbeing. What are the things you are holding onto tightly for fear that if you let go the world may crumble to pieces? What is it you may need to let go of to allow God's peace to wash over you?

During the season of harvest, we stop and take time to reflect on God's generosity and how we can show generosity to those around us. Maybe this harvest, amid the hustle and bustle of trying to get all the harvest 'ducks in a row', why not take time to be generous to yourself too? I pray that wherever you feel you are in life at the moment, that you may allow yourself the generosity to slow down, to give yourself up to God's generosity of love and care and generously let go of the things that are beyond your control. I don't know about you, but as the saying goes, '*My ducks are certainly not in a row, I don't even know where some of them are and I'm pretty sure one of them is a pigeon'*.

May the God of harvest be with you all.

LETTER FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Friends,

The changing of the seasons can evoke a range of feelings and emotions. Shorter evenings and days bring longer nights. For some, this brings a sense of well-being of being 'cosy' whilst for others it is less positive. The falling leaves can bring a sense of loss, as can the shorter days, which is perhaps emphasised as we head towards November and Remembrance Day. Yet here we are in October and this year I've been reflecting in a different way and thinking about the generosity that comes with Autumn.

Late September and early October are often associated with Harvest Festivals. This is a time where we celebrate the goodness and generosity of God. The growth cycle means that we see the fruit of the labours literally come to fruition. The harvest is gathered, fruits and berries collected and, where there is an abundance, conserved in various ways either through freezing or the making of jams and preserves.

Throughout the Bible we see the abundance and generosity of God. In the creation of the world, we see God's grace at work. The perfection described in the early chapters of Genesis shows us the world as it is intended to be. We see the life of God revealed in Jesus Christ who lived amongst the whole of humanity sharing the compassion and grace of God with everyone. His dying and rising again to bring new life to all who turn to him is an act of such huge generosity that it is almost incomprehensible. Through the Holy Spirit, we see God's love and grace active in the world today as we seek to live out the values of the Kingdom.

As Christians we often talk about how we can serve or give to others. Creation has undoubtedly provided something of a model for this in the giving of the fruits and crops that we share in. Autumn is a blaze of colour which brightens up the shortening days. At the same time, the falling leaves give back to God's creation nutrients to the soil, the trees produce berries which provide food for wildlife, and the basis of pollination by insects for the future. The generosity shown in the life of God is in both giving and receiving.

We are sustained by Jesus and receive from him the grace and compassion we need so that we can share it with others through the Spirit. As we give to others we need to receive from God. The invitation to come to God is personal and most definitely for everyone. It is offered through the free flow of grace so that abundant life can be experienced by all.

As we travel through the next few days and weeks, let's reflect on the giving and receiving as a cycle of life where we receive from God and give to others out of our love for God.
