Dear Friends,

A few weekends ago, my family and I visited Dedham for the first time. I had heard so much about the beautiful village and well, it's Constable Country! There was plenty to be excited about. We attempted to do the walk partway towards Flatford Mill along the River Stour. However, we realised about a quarter way into the walk that our footgear was not suitable for what this walk would entail. We should have worn our wellies! The further we got the muddier it became and soon enough we were squelching through thick gloopy mud for the rest of the walk. Looking back at that experience, I realised I had been so focused on looking at the ground and where I was stepping that I hadn't taken the time to drink in the beauty of the scenery around me.

Sometimes when we're so focused on looking down or looking into the details we may miss the bigger picture. The details are important, but I wonder whether there might be a tendency to be 'stuck in the mud' if we never look up to see the fuller landscape around us. We recently had our 'Vision for the Future' meeting and spent some time looking at the bigger picture of where we currently might be as a church. From the information we gathered, it was plain to see that the church is doing quite a lot, especially in terms of making connections with our community. That is something to celebrate!

February is a busy month. There will be plenty of the finer details to focus on. We have our first Church Council of the year. On 11th February we will be welcoming three children into our church through baptism. Then we begin our Lenten journey on Ash

Wednesday which will be preceded by Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day, when traditionally all the sugar was used up in the household to prepare for Lent. Some of us may choose to either give up or take on something during Lent. No matter how we choose to follow this Lenten journey, may we be reminded that all the smaller details of this season ultimately lead us to the bigger picture of Easter and Christ's resurrection. The message of Easter is the backdrop to Lent and all we believe in as Christians.

May you discover afresh the broader landscape of God's love for you as you journey through this Lent. I feel the words said at the moment of baptism can have meaning for all of us as we ponder on the bigger picture of what Jesus did for us.

For you Jesus Christ came into the world; For you he lived and showed God's love; For you he suffered death on the Cross; For you he triumphed over death, Rising to newness of life; For you he prays at God's right hand: All this for you, Before you could know anything of it. (Methodist Worship Book)

Our annual Covenant service at Wimpole Road took place on 21 January, led for the first time by Rev. Hannah - an opportunity for us to recognise all that God has done for us, and renew our own covenant with God. On 24 January, we held our Vision for the Future meeting where, guided by Rev. Hannah, we reviewed the work we are currently involved in at Wimpole Road as part of our Mission Plan and how this links to the calling of the Methodist Church through Worship, Learning and Caring, Service and Evangelism.

It was so encouraging to see how many active ventures there are, including Warm Space and Coffee Mornings, Toddler Group, Carpet Bowls, Thursday Circle, Make Lunch and Community Larder, Holiday Club, Community Day, Soup Run and Food Bank (at St. Stephen's). These are all in addition to our worship on Sunday mornings and evenings (as part of Three Together), Prayer and Bible Study groups. We continue to look for ways to develop in the Church, including our ongoing work to improve our Eco Church credentials.

LETTER FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Friends,

Sometimes when we go for a walk down the street, we see something that grabs our attention. This may be an advert or a well-dressed window or something that is slightly out of the ordinary for a particular reason. Often it is just there, and rarely does it come with any form of explanation.

A week or so ago, I was walking down the High Street when a sign caught my eye. It said, *'How can we tell people that we exist?'* It well and truly got my attention, not least because it was next to a vacant shop. Next to it was some explanation as to the artist, Mark Titchner who has been commissioned by Our Colchester Business Improvement District in collaboration with Firstsite. He is producing artwork based on questions suggested by Colchester residents focusing on life in the city today.

This question 'how can we tell people that we exist?' could mean so many different things. It could be about advertising for someone to come and fill an empty shop, raise the profile and aspirations of the city or a plea for something to change. I immediately read it in the context of the story of God. We are told in the Bible that we should share the Kingdom of God with others or at the end of Matthew's gospel to go and make disciples as in the Great Commission. Archbishop William Temple once said, 'The church is the only cooperative society in the world which exists for the benefit of its non-members.' How can we do that if we don't tell people we exist?

As we continue to have a focus on how we reach out as churches and as a Circuit to others, this is a valuable question for us today. The Methodist Church in its statement of 'Our Calling' talks of four aspects: Worship, Learning and Caring, Service and Evangelism. For evangelism we are asked to make more followers of Christ. We can only do that if we tell people we exist.

How we share with others the love and grace of God, through Christ is done through our being empowered by the Holy Spirit. We don't do it on our own. We do it with and through God but also with each other. Every church has its own way of letting others know we exist, but we mustn't hide our lights under a bushel. As individuals, we can share our faith in the simple ways that help others through words and actions see something of the care and compassion of Christ.

The answer to the question 'how can we tell people that we exist' may look different for each person and church but it is a good question on which to ponder. We may feel that we can't share our faith, or we don't know what to do. The sign on the High Street is bold and eye catching. Let's not be afraid to ask others the question that's on the sign and trust in the Holy Spirit to enable the conversations to unfold and see where it leads.

'GREENER' SEA, RAIL AND LORRY JOURNEY

I thought that you and especially our rail enthusiasts, Gabriel, Myles, Peter Studd and Richard Bruce and our ECO leader Sally Crafer would be interested in the following item taken from The Railway magazine:

Operated by a freight company for Maritime Transport the journey on the morning of September 28 last year formed part of a three- leg lower emission container movement operation.

Unloaded from the 'Laura Maersk' a new vessel built with the aim of reducing greenhouse gas output by running on methanol, the container headed northwards as part of a train hauled by a hydro-treated vegetable oil-fuelled locomotive where emissions are estimated to be 90% lower than diesel.

The final leg of the container's trip was to Maersk's warehouse facility by electric lorry.
