Dear Friends,

Recently, my family and I went to watch the Colchester vs Crewe football match at the Colchester stadium. I'm afraid I am not a football fan. Since moving here, Yoon and Naythan have become quite the football fans and well, they twisted mine, Reyna and Laelle's arm to come along and join the 'fun'. I haven't fully grasped the game but there is something to be said about being immersed in that crowd amid all the chants, singing and cheers. I found it captivating in a strange way. The strong sense of unity, as people chanted and cheered (or booed) together felt infectious and drew me to be a part of it. However, I did not understand the words they chanted nor did I know when to sit, stand, boo, shout or sing. Much of it felt quite alien to me and at times, I wished someone would simply explain it to me.

This led me to reflect upon how those who are unfamiliar with the Church might find stepping through the doors and sitting through our services. Will it feel alien? Will the words we speak make sense? Will the music mean anything? Will people wonder what we are doing when we share in Holy Communion? Will people wish that someone would explain it to them?

I have been deeply struck by a recent lectionary Bible passage from Acts. It is about Philip who encounters an Ethiopian eunuch on the wilderness road. Philip hears him reading a scripture passage from Isaiah aloud and asks whether he understands what he is reading. The eunuch responds, *"How can I unless someone explains it to me?"* (Acts 8:31). That response has stayed with me and continues to pose a challenge for me. How will people

understand unless we explain it to them? Do *we* understand or question what, how and why we do things the way we do? When asked about our faith, discipleship and worship will we be able to explain in plain, simple and accessible language?

May celebrates Pentecost, which recalls the coming of the Holy Spirit in power to the disciples, transforming them from people who were afraid to those who were empowered to speak the word of God beyond human fears and barriers. We too are riding that Pentecost wave with our fellow early church sisters and brothers. Though we may not always feel it, Christ has breathed the Holy Spirit into each one of us. We have the Spirit in us therefore, we needn't fear and can speak with boldness about who we are and what we're about. It is a challenge, but may you remember that the love of God within you is infectious and therefore cannot be contained. It will and does shine through.

May the outpouring and anointing Spirit of Pentecost be with you all.

LETTER FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT

There are times when some short quotes can really get you thinking. A. A. Milne is famous for writing the Winnie-the-Pooh books and 'The Little Book of Wisdom' contains some 'Wise Words from the Best Bear in All the World.' Winnie the Pooh is sat alongside Christopher Robin and says *"It isn't much good having anything exciting, if you can't share it with somebody. It's so much more friendly with two."*

There are many thoughts which could be offered around this quote. I'm writing this on the day of the London Marathon where professional and amateur runners all participate in the same race. One picture I saw was of two people running together as a camel. Now that is companionship! Not only do they need to last the course but do it completely together and alongside each other. There are many running the London Marathon as something which is an adventure, as well as those who are trying to raise money for charities because of times of adversity in the lives of family and friends.

In this Easter season, many of the readings we have at this time of year focus on the postresurrection appearances of Jesus to the disciples. The disciples can relate to their closest friend in a new way.
