Dear Friends,

Our children have been asking for pets for a long time. We finally gave in and now have two additions to our family. Two guinea pigs named Pepper and Pumpkin. Although there seems to be hay everywhere and the manse is beginning to smell like a farm, we have fallen in love with them! They are so fun to watch and I am completely mesmerised by God's wonderful creation each time I watch them.

You may know that guinea pigs make lots of different sounds. The 'Wheek! Wheek!' sound is probably the most familiar to people. Apparently, this is the sound they use most to get the attention of their human friends. It usually means 'Feed me' or 'I'm happy to see you!'. If the 'wheek' is more shrieky it can mean they are in pain or fear. We have noticed that when they hear our footsteps they call to us with their 'Wheek! Wheek!' Then when they see us, they come rushing towards us hoping we will give them a tasty treat. It brings me great joy when they do this.

This made me reflect on our communication with God. How do we call out to God when we want God's attention? When we feel lost, not knowing where to go or the choices we need to make, do we call out to God for guidance and direction? When we are joyful, sad or in pain, do we call out to God? Is God our first point of call when we are in need or our last resort?

When the disciples faced a storm out at sea (Matthew 8:23-27), the first thing they did was to call to Jesus and seek his help. He calmed the raging chaos before their eyes and calmed their fears. How do we react to the little or big forms of chaos that sneak into our lives? Do we tend to panic like the disciples? Put up defences? Or make rash decisions?

I am finding that being in ministry requires me to make decisions daily about all manner of things. At times there is no manual to tell me what to do. When I am up against a situation that looks too big to handle I can sense the storm of confusion brewing in me.

Nevertheless, it is in those moments I can trust that God sees the bigger picture and when I call will gently calm my anxieties and show me the next steps.

God desires that we call to him and not keep things bottled up inside us. I like to think that God wants to feel needed by us too. God delights when we call and rush up to him a bit like how I feel when the guinea pigs run to me with their 'wheeks'. God is waiting to hear you call to him. God delights to hear the nitty-gritty details of your life.

However, whenever you feel you need a 'human friend' to talk to please don't hesitate to get in touch with me or any of us in your church family. You are not alone and we are on this journey together.

# LETTER FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Friends,

I wonder when the last time was you experienced something so beautiful or overwhelming that you couldn't help but say 'Wow!' or let out a gasp as a response? Sometimes, maybe often, it's in relation to a new sight, experience or situation. It is something which has left its mark on us for all the right reasons, and which leaves us being aware that we have witnessed something which has made a positive impact on our lives.

By the time you read this, it will have been a couple of weeks since I visited Colchester Zoo with family. It was a great day and one where throughout the entire time we were there we heard lots of positive exclamations. Some were in relation to the 'cuteness' of certain animals, or the recognition of the size of some of the animals in real life as opposed to pictures. There was no doubt that a lasting impression had been made on many people.

This is a tangible sense of awe and wonder. It can come through new experiences or through looking at landscapes which take our breath away. As I reflected on this, I was drawn to a song in Singing the Faith called 'Jesus, lead us to the Father, by your Spirit.' The second verse talks of drawing near to God in awe and gladness. It is in these sorts of situations, where we experience something new and truly wonderful, that we see the imagination and creativity of God, the Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer of the world at work. It's difficult not to be thankful and to recognise God's presence in the world.

At the same time, are we attentive to the things which are more familiar, but which can still act as moments of awe and wonder? Or are we too busy to notice them because they're not different enough? God's presence is all around us, in the things we see, the people with whom we interact and in the whole of life. To see the wonder of God in everyday life is to recognise once again that we stand on holy ground. Jesus' presence is everywhere through the Holy Spirit and as we look around us there is always something to see that can inspire a sense of awe and wonder and help us to draw near to God.

Looking out of the window can be a moment to behold the different shades of green there are on the leaves, the varying colours of the flowers, the shapes of the clouds in the sky, or the celebration of technology in the cars, bicycles, scooters, buses and other vehicles that go past the end of the drive. These are all expressions of the gifts of creativity and imagination that are God-given. As we go through the next few days and weeks, why not consider where you are drawn to God in awe and wonder in the familiar parts of life as well as in the new and breathtaking experiences?

Why not then give thanks to God for the presence of Christ through the Holy Spirit in the whole of life?
