Dear Friends,

I was driving home on the A12 (as you do), and as I drove past a new housing estate in the process of being built, there was a large sign beside it that said 'YOU'RE ALMOST HOME'. My thought was, 'I'm really glad I'm almost home and isn't it nice I have a home to go to'. I don't always remember to give thanks for the home I have or all the other things I have been blessed with in my life. Many times I do take it for granted. However, the words on that large billboard made me reflect on the concept of home and what it means to have a home to go to, where I can feel at 'home'.

We are well and truly into the season of harvest, and it is that time of the year we can intentionally take a step back and reflect on all we are thankful for. It is also a time we may undoubtedly think and pray for those who do not have enough.

Many do not have homes at this time, particularly with all that is happening in war-torn countries. We are continually hearing of those who are losing their homes, displaced and far away from a physical home but also a homely environment. Then nearer to home we hear of those evicted from their homes, those living in temporary accommodation or those who may not feel at 'home' in their own homes. Then recently we heard of the extremely sad incident where a 13-year-old boy did not make it home after a family birthday on Mersea Road.

It may not be in our position as a church to provide a physical home for people, but we can certainly provide a spiritual home. The type of home where all can feel at 'home' and at peace with God, at peace with themselves and peace with one another. Our church worship,

gatherings, fellowship and the building itself can be a spiritual home where people feel safe, protected and loved with a warmth beyond measure.

Jesus looked at the crowd sitting around him and said, 'Who are my mother and my brothers? Here are my mother and my brothers! Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother.' (Mark 3:31-34). The message Jesus may have desired to share is that his love and acceptance for people transcends that of traditional family ties. He sees all as belonging to his family. That is how our church can offer a spiritual home to all who come through our doors. To ensure that the message 'You are welcome here, you belong and you are family' reaches the hearts and minds of all who need to hear it.

Therefore, 'Wherever you've come from, whatever your age, whoever you are, wherever you've been or whatever you've done' may you know that you are welcome, you belong and God calls you family. So, next time you are on your way to church may you know that 'You're almost home'.

LETTER FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Friends,

A few days before I wrote this, I managed a walk by the sea. On such occasions, I often find myself looking at the names of the beach huts and this day was no exception. There was one particular beach hut called 'Special Sparkles.' On a day where the weather was quite cloudy this was a welcome thing to see. As I continued to walk, the sun appeared from behind a cloud and shone on the sea making it glisten and sparkle. It was a lovely view of something new and bright shining out from a dull background.

By the time we reach October, the seasons have changed. The leaves have largely (but not completely) fallen, and the initial bright colours tend to be replaced by the brown leaves underfoot. It isn't always the time of year where the landscape is at its brightest. The sun glistening on the sea was a sign of illumination and a sparkle of hope. We need signs of hope at all times, but it can be when things feel more like wet, brown leaves underfoot, that we really need to see it. God is the bringer of hope today and it is to God we turn on the days where things are more difficult.

Our sense of hope comes from our faith in what we believe. So often, we reduce hope to wishful thinking but our hope in Christ through the Holy Spirit is so much more. It comes from our belief in God and is something we have within us that means we want to share all that Jesus has done for us through the cross and resurrection with others.

Just as the sun acted as the sign of sparkling hope on the sea, as disciples we are called to be the special sparkle of hope in God's world today. This comes from our faith in Jesus, and we know that the Holy Spirit is active in the world and who will lead and guide us in God's Kingdom today.

God has chosen to partner with human beings and so we ask, how can we be a sparkle of hope to a world in need and how can we partner with God to share Jesus' message of hope to others? As I thought about this, I was drawn to Bernadette Farrell's hymn, 'Longing for light.' We remember those who are longing for light, peace, food and shelter, knowing that many are struggling, are thirsty and cold. Seeking the Holy Spirit, this is an opportunity to help others to see the light of Christ and to see a sparkle of hope. Sometimes, we may be the ones needing that hope ourselves. May we turn to God in prayer and each other, as we seek the peace of the Holy Spirit.

As we come to the season of longer nights and shorter days, may we find the sparkles of light and hope within the world and our own lives. As Bernadette Farrell writes, may 'Christ be our light, shine in our hearts, shine through the darkness. Christ be our light, shine in your Church gathered today.'

APPEAL FOR MEN'S CLOTHING

This is an appeal for men's clothing for the asylum seekers from Wethersfield, who visit Bridgeway's Hub in Long Wyre Street.

We know that there were around 1000 men at Wethersfield last month. Probably the number is similar now, although we understand some have been moved on and new men have arrived. The camp provides buses for the men to visit Braintree, Colchester and Chelmsford. They come to Colchester on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. At the hub we provide snack and drinks, the opportunity to watch films, play darts, pool and table tennis, and generally relax.

Most items of men's clothing will be needed as autumn arrives, particularly: coats, jackets and anoraks, T-shirts and trousers and socks.

All donations can be delivered to the Bridgeway shop in Priory Walk, next door but one to Sainsbury's; the shop is usually open 10 until 2 on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays.
