#### Dear Friends.

I am writing to you from a remotely peaceful place called Launde Abbey in Leicester for my Probationers Retreat. My mind was filled with a mixture of emotions before I came. It was mainly because I wrestled with everything I would have to leave behind and lay aside for a few days, especially my family and, of course, all of you! However, I have found this time beneficial and a much-needed space for reflection and stillness. One of the things I love about this place is the vast number of sheep that dot the hills and grounds surrounding the beautiful abbey. Some of you will know by now that I love animals; therefore, watching sheep so closely has been delightful.

Two things crossed my mind as I observed them. Firstly, they give so much. I looked at their heavy wool coats and felt gratitude for the wool they provide for humans. I was reminded of my favourite wool cardigan, which helps keep me warm in the cold winter months. Sheep give so much to us humans, and wool is only one of the many things on that list. Secondly, they know how to graze and relax. It was wonderful watching them calmly grazing upon green pastures and beside quiet waters and streams. I cannot tell you how peaceful and content their faces looked as they sat there chewing away. Psalm 23 was re-enacted right before my eyes.

These sheep have enabled me to reflect on what it means to give as well as rest upon green pastures. All of us give of ourselves in one way or another to others. It may be our time, energy, talents or resources. We may constantly spend time giving of ourselves. However, if we don't take the space and time to rest and lay aside some of our responsibilities for a while, it will affect our spiritual, mental and physical well-being.

Even Jesus needed time away from people to rest, pray and recharge. During the retreat, we examined the stories of Jesus healing the man with leprosy in Luke 5 and Jesus' Transfiguration in Luke 9. In both passages, Jesus withdraws to quiet places to pray alone. We were asked to ponder the question, 'As a busy minister, what kind of space or location do you intentionally seek out as a place to pray?'

So, I want to leave that question and a couple of others with you, especially as you navigate this upcoming season of Lent and take that journey toward Easter.

As a busy .... (fill in the space), what kind of space or location do you intentionally seek out as a place to pray? How might you make time and space to be still and alone with God? What might God be asking you to lay aside so you can rest with God upon green pastures? I hope those questions can help you as you walk through Lent, and may you find the place for stillness to find God and yourself.

#### THE 'PROJECT' UPDATE

The Church Council unanimously voted to continue with the proposed project and have chosen the contractors to carry out the necessary works.

A recap on the work:

- To install a small kitchenette at the rear of the church building on the right hand side as you enter. This will include a sink and water supply, cupboards for storage of cups and supplies and a water heater.
- Move the technology desk forward to allow room for the above.
- To install a new and up to date visual and audio system, which will include a large monitor on both sides at the front of the church. This will enable a clear view of the screen from all points in the congregational seating area.

- The choir monitor will remain in the same position and a small screen will be added for the organist to see by the organ.
- Three pews will be removed from all three sections at the back of the church to accommodate the kitchenette, tech. station, some tables and chairs and room for a small children's area on the left hand side.
- These pews will be used to make the cabinets etc. to keep the working area as discreet as possible and in keeping with the rest of the church, as well as cutting down on waste and cost by recycling the material.
- The minister's toilet and the vestry will undergo some changes to allow an accessible toilet to be built.

This means that when both halls are being hired the church can be used independently for meetings, without having to enter the school rooms or toilets, as required in safeguarding guidance.

The aim of the whole project is to use our church premises as best we can to encourage further fellowship as part of our Sunday worship; to cut down on heating bills in the winter and be able to incorporate other forms of worship perhaps in the week.

Cook and Long have been chosen from the three quotations received to complete the building work.

D & M Music Ltd, a company specialising in church building Audio Visual work, were selected from the four quotations received.

# The next steps:

Notification of the proposed works needs to be added to the circuit and district database and the circuit meeting notified before the next meeting on  $10^{th}$  April.

Grant forms to the circuit and the district need to be completed and submitted by 20<sup>th</sup> March ready for the circuit grants committee on 3<sup>rd</sup> April.

The district grant deadline is 27<sup>th</sup> May. We are applying for £10,000 from each.

If all of the above is successful, we can then begin the work.

Please keep all those involved in your prayers and most importantly the reason we are embarking on this venture so that we have as many opportunities as possible to bring people into God's kingdom, to support and encourage one another and share our faith together.

#### LETTER FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT

Over the past week or so, I have undertaken a variety of different journeys. On two occasions, I needed to travel to Hoddesdon for particular meetings. Having established it would be about 1.5 hours to where I was needing to be, I allowed myself ample time. On the first occasion, it took 3 hours 20 minutes and on the second occasion 1.5 hours. Quite a difference in so many ways.

The same journey felt very different each time. The first had left me very sorry for others who had had a worse day than me, otherwise the motorway wouldn't have been closed in the first place. At the same time, there was some frustration that I couldn't make progress and be where I needed to be. The second journey saw me arrive with nearly an hour to spare and feeling much more at peace as a consequence.

As we enter March, Lent begins during the first week. Lent is a period in the church where we journey together in our discipleship as we then approach Holy Week and Easter which, this year, fall in April. Sometimes our discipleship journeys are easier than others, but we can rest assured knowing that Jesus is with us through the Holy Spirit in whatever situation we find ourselves in.

Our journey of faith is ongoing and sometimes we may find that we see this from different perspectives. There are times where it is difficult and other times where things seem to be a bit easier. Wherever we are in ourselves and with God, we know that Jesus is walking alongside us. In Philippians 3, Paul writes about the need to 'press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.' We know that God's grace is there for all who turn to Jesus and that this is assured. We can rest easy in that. At the same time, we will want to seek to become more like Christ, and to share the message of salvation with others so they can come to know Jesus for themselves. There are times where this is easier than at others.

As we enter Lent, and a period of preparation ahead of Holy Week and Easter, let's use it as a time and season for learning more about how God is working in our life and in the life of the communities in which we live. We do this by drawing close to God and allowing Jesus to work in us, to help to shape our character, and to recognise how the Holy Spirit is working. If we are feeling that we are in a difficult season, let's stop to notice all that is going on around us. If we are in a time of feeling more at peace, then let's not be afraid to share this with others. As we come alongside others, they may also be encouraged in their own journey of discipleship.

As we journey through life, may we continue to recognise the peace and presence of Jesus in all we do.

#### ALL THINGS BRIGHT AND BEAUTIFUL

Spring is in the air. Seeds are being sowed; the snowdrops are peeking through, and we give thanks to our Creator God who made all things great and small. In churches throughout our Circuit there is a hive of activity go on to show that Colchester Methodist Circuit cares for creation and climate justice.

Many of our churches are using **A Rocha** UK's **Eco Church** programme to care for creation and the survey covers five key areas of church life:

- Worship and teaching
- Buildings and energy
- Land and nature
- Community and global engagement
- Lifestyle

Here at Wimpole Road Methodist Church we need to celebrate being awarded the Silver Eco Church Award.



We have achieved this by hosting external speakers belonging to the Green Christian movement and were delighted they have led worship with us. We always include care of creation in our intercession's prayers and one of the hymns of weekly Sunday worship is praising God and creation.

We are planning to set targets for reducing the carbon footprint for our church. We now have a water butt for rainwater collection facilities, We now use water saving devises in all our toilets so less water is needed for each flush. We are considering using recycled toilet paper in the future, which today is as soft and strong as any other type! We now have cycle racks on our church premises to promote people using our church to cycle instead of using cars, although we have discovered that most people in New Town walk to church.

We want to stress we have very little land other than our church building. We are talking about less than 4 metres square (please see Google Maps)

We have put out planters, we are particularly proud of repurposing a step ladder and making it a multiple planter where wild flower seeds have been sown.

We have been advised against putting food stations for wildlife because of rat's infestations. Possibilities we could consider would be a bird box or bug hotel. Partaking wildlife survey on our land e.g. RSPB great British bird count.

We could consider growing strawberries and tomatoes in pot containers this coming year.

We are also keen to extend our planters to the side of the church on Harsnett Road, but require help to weed this area and to lay down a weed membrane and provide stones.

We have a Recreational Ground next door to the church, which is owned by the council but we use it for outdoor ecumenical worship e.g. Pentecostal services and for Community Fun Day. I am sure we could make better use of this gift of God by arranging our local people to join us on a walk around it to notice nature or do some litter picking.

We could commit our church to pray for a specific oversea environmental project. We could continue to raise funds to be able to twin more of our toilets.

We need to consider as a church whether we could promote the personal use and consumption of Fairtrade/ethically sourced goods, Is it going too far to encourage ethical investment of personal savings? I think that we could include practical lifestyle tips and advice on caring for God's earth in our church newsletter and/on our church website.

As I began let's work together as a church, as a circuit and even as a district to and continue to keep 'All things Bright and Beautiful' to prevent further damage to Earth and become better custodians of God's beautiful creation.
