Dear Friends,

I am currently writing to you roughly 70 miles away from home at the Focolare Centre for Unity in Welwyn Garden City. I am here for an Early Years in Ministry Retreat. This retreat is offering me a valuable space to reflect, *be*, and ponder this journey of ministry. However, I don't always find it easy being away from home, and in some respects, I feel as though I am in an 'in-between' place where I don't feel quite so grounded.

The theme for this retreat is 'Encounters with the Divine', and we are exploring this by looking at several encounters Jesus had in the gospels. One of the encounters we reflected on is when Jesus heals the ten lepers in Luke 17:11–19. Something that struck me about this story is that it specifically says the event took place in the "region between Samaria and Galilee." It doesn't describe an exact location, only that it happened somewhere between. And it is in this somewhere between, between two places, two identities, two worlds, that this remarkable encounter with Jesus and the ten lepers unfolds.

I wonder whether it is also in those places in our own lives that are somewhere *between*, those unsettled spaces, those times of transition, that encounters with our God who is divine can emerge. Where would you say you encounter God in your daily life? Where do you experience moments of noticing the divine or sacred around you in the ordinary? The spaces or moments where we feel closest to God, where we glimpse God's presence in the ordinary, are often called the *thin places*.

I spend quite a bit of time driving from one place to the next often in between churches. I have found that the time and space in my car driving between places has become somewhere I encounter and connect with God. I would even say my yellow car is one of those *thin places* for me! Where might your own thin place be?

I believe the seasons of Advent and Christmas can themselves be understood as a thin place, a time when heaven meets earth inexplicably. It can be a season that offers small moments and glimpses of the holy: those moments when Jesus comes close, quietly and tenderly, to stand beside you. It may even be in those times when you feel you have no strength left, yet encounter a small flicker of light reminding you that God is with you.

And so, my prayer for you this Advent is that you discover the thin places where God breathes and draws close. May you sense God in the quiet, the ordinary, the in-between. And as Christmas draws near, may the light of Christ that once slipped into the world slip gently into your own life, bringing hope, peace, and the soft assurance that you are never alone.

NEWS FROM THE VESTRY

As we prepare for Christmas there is a lot being planned, but before that we should look back at some of the preparations we have been making at church, not just for Christmas but, for the longer term here at Wimpole Road. As we seek to move forward and further enhance our fellowship and missional work, we continue to develop our church building to keep it up to date and the best it can be to support the work we feel called to do.

Thanks once again especially to Edward for his project management and oversight of our 'Kitchenette Project', to create a kitchen area at the back of the church along with more multi-functional seating space; the creation of a new accessibility toilet (with a reconfiguring of the vestry) and the refurbishment of the vestibule area. All of this was made possible with a very generous donation from Jean and David Ablewhite's family in their memory, along with grants from both the District and the Colchester Circuit. It was such a joy when Rev. Hannah dedicated these for us at our service in early November.

As is the case with all these types of projects, and especially when working with an old building such as ours, there are often 'bumps' along the way and on-going building related issues. The vestibule re-flooring turned out to be somewhat more complex than expected and we have new challenges with both our gas supply into the building and also one of our central heating boilers - all of which take up time and money and we ask for your prayers that solutions can be found to these new matters.

As we move forward and (as suggested at the General Church Meeting), acknowledging that increasingly people don't carry a lot of cash with them, we have introduced a new way of giving to church funds. You will have seen at the back of the church we have some new QR codes on display - these are designed to enable people who wish to give via their mobile phone to do so. We have also introduced a new card reader to take payments using credit / debit cards or smart phones. These are intended as a new way of giving but we would ask that those who give via standing order, the weekly envelopes or cash **do not** switch to the card / QR system please, as there is additional cost involved in receiving payments via these new systems.

If you have any questions about this or want to discuss the most cost-efficient way of giving, please do speak to Edward our Treasurer. The new QR code will also be published in the monthly Newsround.

And so, to the BIG event looming into sight - yes Christmas! Once again, we are delighted to say that we have a full programme of services and events planned for the festive season to suit all needs and preferences. Further details of these are set out later in the Newsround and there are postcards at the back of the church and in the hall with full details of the services and events. Please pick one up and take away with you. There are also sufficient if you want to take some of them to share with friends and family to invite them to come along.

And, let us not forget the underlying reasons for all this preparation and planning. Please remain focused on the fact that as Christians this is all being done to remember and celebrate the birth of our Lord Jesus and this wonderful opportunity that we have to share the Good News of his birth and his everlasting love for all with everybody.

LETTER FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT

The book by Charlie Mackesey, 'The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse', is a wonderful book of short phrases of wisdom and pictures which help us to think and reflect. It is a book which follows the friendship of a boy, a mole, a fox and a horse. One of the pictures is of the four characters sitting in the night in a big, open space and the phrase "Home isn't always a place, is it?"

I wonder where we find our sense of home? Is it the building in which we live? Is it the town from which we come? Or is it a feeling of being at home, maybe with others, or a contentment from our own space?

As we come into December, we move into the season of Advent and then Christmas. We are looking ahead with anticipation in a season of waiting where we are preparing to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Those who are preparing for a birth of a baby go to a lot of time and effort to make the welcome for the child as good as it can be. Nurseries are decorated, clothes bought, along with the various pieces of equipment which are needed. The child is either born at home or comes home at the relevant moment. In this sense, we often find home as being a specific place.

Jesus was born in a stable, not a palace. He was born in a borrowed room, not at home. He was wrapped in swaddling bands, and didn't have a huge wardrobe waiting for him. Jesus was born in Bethlehem, yet Mary and Joseph came from Nazareth. When Jesus was born, he came to the world as God in human form. For this time, his home was to show others that the Kingdom of God had come near in the person of Christ. For Jesus, home wasn't a specific place at all.

Jesus' home remained with God the Father and is active today through the Holy Spirit. Jesus sought to show others that home was a place of peace and contentment. Resting in the hands of God is to be at home. It is to know the wholeness and completeness which comes only through him.

As Jesus was laid in a manger, his love for the whole world shone out to it. The angels shared the message of his arrival. The shepherds and the magi came to worship him. They knew that home wasn't a physical place but they knew, through their encounters with him, that they had found an expression of home. As they encountered Jesus, they experienced salvation, and shared this with others.

As we come to Christmas this year, do we feel at home? Are we resting in the hands of God? Are we willing to recognize and share the encounter with Jesus we have so that others may know his love for themselves? Whether we are at home or travelling to friends and family this year, I hope that all goes well as we make the plans and prepare everything for the festive season. Let us also stop and recognize that Jesus invites us to be at home with him, wherever we are.

ADVENT RING

The request "Come and light the candles on the Advent Ring" is a call to begin the tradition of lighting candles on an Advent wreath, a practice that symbolizes the coming of Christ.

This involves lighting one new candle each Sunday of Advent, for a total of four candles, and a central white candle on Christmas Day.

The meaning of the candles:

- **Hope:** The first candle lit often represents hope.
- **Faith:** The second candle represents faith.
- **Joy:** The third candle, lit on the third Sunday represents joy.
- <u>Peace</u>: The fourth candle can symbolize peace.
- <u>Christ Candle</u>: The central white candle is lit on Christmas Day to represent the birth of Jesus, the light of the world.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF CRICKET

I have been reading a delightful book 'The Commonwealth of Cricket', written by Ramachandra Guha. The author is one of India's best-known historians, a cricket fan who has spent a lifetime both playing and watching the game of cricket in India.

The book, however, contains a couple of pieces that are worth sharing.

In his final year at school, he writes of a bearded white man whose defensive batting resulted in a drawn match.

As they walked off the field the author said to the white man, "You play with a straight bat."

He replied,

"My friend, in cricket as much as in life, one must always play with a straight bat."

Wise words and a reminder to be always honest and trustworthy.

And from a lecture given by the legendary Sri Lankan player Kumar Sangakkara in 2011: in his lecture he referred to the violence against the Tamils in Colombo in 1983, noting that his own, proudly non- sectarian, family gave refuge to thirty-five Tamil friends on the run.

Towards the end of the lecture, he returned to the theme of inter-faith and inter-community harmony and said when he played cricket for Sri Lanka,

"With me are all my people. I am Tamil, Sinhalese, Muslim and Burgher. I am a Buddhist, a Hindu, a follower of Islam and Christianity."

Wise words.

A PRAYER FOR OUR PERSECUTED CHRISTIAN BROTHERS AND SISTERS

Luke 21:12-13

Jesus said, "But before all these things, they will seize you and persecute you, delivering you up to the synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and rulers for My Name's sake. It will turn out as a testimony for you."

In a report by 'Open Doors', who monitor the World Watch List, shared by a British Government report, it was found that more than 365 million Christians worldwide 'faced high levels of persecution and discrimination for their faith'. This represented one in seven Christians globally, one in five in Africa and two in five in Asia. In the top 50 countries covered by the world watch list, '317 million Christians face very high or extreme levels of persecution and discrimination'.

{There have been several debates and British Government Reports produced over the years, as the British Government has been well aware of Christian and Christian Community Persecution around the globe; the latest one being entitled 'Persecution of Christians' [House of Commons Library, Persecution of Christians, Debate Pack 28 March 2025 CDP-0076 (2025)]. In these documents they took a wide range of evidence, from the Catholic News Agency, Newsweek, ADF International, and Open Doors. Open Doors [www.opendoorsuk.org] being the organisation that looks after the World Watch List that highlights the top 50 countries with the most persecution, and other events against Christian people.}

As a Christian in the UK, we rarely experience anything as bad as many of our fellow Christian brothers and sisters around the world.

Dear Heavenly Father,

When we feel powerless, ignored or felt apathetic against, in this Christmas season where we celebrate the birth of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, we pray that we may remember our fellow Christian brothers and sisters in countries where there are personal and property dispossession, forcible intolerance and actual genocide.

Living in a country where we are free to choose what we believe, how we express it, and why we believe it, we acknowledge that we are extremely fortunate and blessed to experience those freedoms.

We pray that we will not use that freedom of belief and expression to rest on our laurels, but instead use our Christian witness to stand up for those who don't have those same freedoms.

We pray that as we celebrate the birth of our Lord and Saviour, we pray for endurance in our faiths so that we can gain our souls.

Help us to make our nation a beacon of light, where everyone has the freedom of choice to choose their own beliefs, meet freely together, and express themselves as they are.

Help us to be a people of grace, tolerance, and love, where we show by our own witness the Lord Jesus' Christ's love and grace to others, no matter who they are, where they come from, or how they identify.

We ask this prayer in the power of the name of Jesus, the love of God, and the presence of the Holy Spirit, in our lives. Amen.


